APPROVED PURPOSES AS DEFINED IN THE ONE ARIZONA AGREEMENT

Through evidence-based, evidence-informed, or promising programs or strategies:

A. Treat Opioid Use Disorder (OUD)

Support treatment of OUD and any co-occurring Substance Use Disorder or Mental Health (SUD/MH) conditions, co-usage, and/or co-addiction.

B. Support People in Treatment and Recovery

Support people in treatment for and recovery from OUD and any co-occurring SUD/MH conditions, co-usage, and/or co-addiction.

C. Connect People Who Need Help to the Help They Need (Connections to Care)

Provide connections to care for people who have – or are at risk of developing – OUD and any co-occurring SUD/MH conditions, co-usage, and/or co-addiction.

D. Address the Needs of Criminal-Justice-Involved Persons

Address the needs of persons with OUD and any co-occurring SUD/MH conditions, co-usage, and/or co-addiction who are involved – or are at risk of becoming involved – in the criminal justice system.

E. Address the Needs of Pregnant or Parenting Women and their Families, Including Babies with Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome

Address the needs of pregnant or parenting women with OUD and any co-occurring SUD/MH conditions, co-usage, and/or co-addiction, and the needs of their families, including babies with neonatal abstinence syndrome.

F. Prevent Over-Prescribing and Ensure Appropriate Prescribing and Dispensing of Opioids

- G. Discourage or Prevent Misuse of Opioids
- H. Prevent or Reduce Overdose Deaths and Other Opioid-Related Harms

I. First Responders

Support current and future law enforcement expenditures relating to the opioid epidemic and educate law enforcement or other first responders regarding appropriate practices and precautions when dealing with fentanyl or other drugs.

J. Leadership, Planning and Coordination

Support community regional planning to identify goals, areas and populations with the greatest needs for treatment intervention services; a government dashboard to track key opioid-related indicators and supports as identified through collaborative community processes; invest in infrastructure or staffing at government or not-for-profit agencies to support collaborative efforts; provide resources to staff government oversight and management of opioid abatement programs.

K. Support Training to Abate the Opioid Epidemic Through Activities, Programs, or Strategies

L. Support Opioid Abatement Research

Including evaluation of programs and strategies described in this opioid abatement strategy list, use of non-opioid treatment of chronic pain, innovative enforcement efforts, deterrence of opioid misuse within criminal justice populations, and medication assisted treatment such as prescription methadone.
